COURSE DESCRIPTION: DRAMA 3

Prerequisite: Drama 2 AB (P) with "B" or higher, or permission of instructor Drama 3AB is an advanced class, including directing and design.

COURSE DESCRIPTION: DRAMA 4

Prerequisite: Drama 3 AB (P) with "B" or higher, or permission of instructor

Drama 4 AB will involve advanced work in acting, building on the skills and techniques developed in previous course work, and will encourage the development of effective creative expression and leadership ability in Theatre Arts. Areas of study may include advanced work in characterization, motivation, character analysis, stage movement and gestures, and use of body and voice in theatrical production.

PRIORITY STANDARDS

This is a California standards-based course (with careful, selective attention to appropriate ELA Common Core Standards). All standards will be taught, with a special emphasis on the following (http://www.cde.ca.gov/be/st/ss/thadvanced.asp):

1.0 ARTISTIC PERCEPTION

Students observe their environment and respond, using the elements of theatre. They also observe formal and informal works of theatre, film/video, and electronic media and respond, using the vocabulary of theatre.

Students analyze the role and development of theatre, film/video, and electronic media in past

4.0 AESTHETIC VALUING

Students critique and derive meaning from works of theatre, film/video, electronic media, and theatrical artists on the basis of aesthetic qualities.

5.0 CONNECTIONS, RELATIONSHIPS, APPLICATIONS

Students apply what they learn in theatre, film/video, and electronic media across subject areas. They develop competencies and creative skills in problem solving, communication, and time management that contribute to lifelong learning and career skills. They also learn about careers in and related to theatre.

CLASSROOM CONDUCT AND EXPECTATIONS

- Students are expected to be on time and ready to learn when the bell rings. This includes preparedness of any and all assignments that are due that class period. Students entering the class after the bell will be marked "tardy" in the attendance record.
- BE RESPECTFUL AND RESPONSIBLE. Any writing in which a student engages must be appropriate. This means no references to drugs, alcohol, sexuality, or other unsuitable issues. Anything considered unkind or inconsiderate is unacceptable.

- Be positive and willing to try! Listen to instructions and follow them the first time they are given! *There are no excuses!*

BATHROOM POLICY

This rule is subject to change at any time without warning.

You may use the bathroom as needed; however, this is privilege that will be removed if it is abused. Class time is for academic learning; passing periods, break, before and after school, and lunch are for taking care of personal needs. I do recognize that sometimes there are emergencies that can not wait. Typically, I will require you leave your ID card and/or your phone with me when you use the restroom in addition to taking a the class hall pass.

OVERVIEW OF ASSIGNMENTS

Below is an overview of the assignments students are expected to participate in this year. The majority of assignments will be covered; assignments are subject to change or modification or can be added or deleted at anytime during the year at the discretion of the instructor.

Daily Participation:

Students are expected to *voluntarily* participate in daily classroom assignments and activities to receive full credit (10 points each class meeting). **This is an "all or nothing" assignment.** If you are absent, it

is your responsibility to see Ms. Paxton for an assignment to make up these points. **Note: being on your phone, being tardy, or not participating completely put you at risk for losing these points.

Writing and Theatre Projects

- **Critiques:** *Students are required to attend and write two critiques* of a live theatre performance per semester at a local theatre. This can be intermediate school, high school, college, community, or professional theatre. Additional critiques can be submitted for additional credit. *Critiques turned in past two weeks of attendance will not be accepted under an circumstance.*

- **Performance/Production:** *Students are encouraged to participate* in one or more Bear Stage Productions over the course of the year. "Participation" may include, but is not limited to: acting, directing, choreographing, building, stage-managing, tech-ing, selling tickets, ushering, etc.

EVALUATION OF ASSIGNMENTS

Student work will be evaluated on the basis of quality, range of style, depth and complexity of thinking, creativity and originality, and mechanical correctness.

LATE WORK POLICY:

An assignment is considered late if it is not turned into the teacher by the designated due date. ALL late assignments will be awarded 50% of what the assignment deserves. An assignment worth 10 points can not receive more than a 5/10 if it is late. I will not accept work past a 6-week grading period. If you are absent, it is *your responsibility* to contact the teacher to obtain any and all missed materials and information. The website calendar is also an excellent way to keep track daily of what is happening in class and what is for homework. If you missed a test or fail to turn in an essay on time, you may turn in these assignments for late credit within the grading period that it was assigned. Assignment deadlines are non-negotiable. If a student is absent on the day of a test, he/she will be expected to be ready to take the test on the day he/she returns to class. Students will be allowed the same number of days they were absent to make up assignments, assuming the absence is excused.

CHEATING AND PLAGIARISM

Students will be expected to complete assignments and tests to the best of **their personal ability** to reveal their learning. Cheating violates this belief and will not be tolerated. Anyone caught cheating will automatically fail the assignment and be subject to school and district penalties.

Plagiarism is the act of using another person's work and submitting it as your own. This behavior is **unacceptable**. Anyone caught plagiarizing will automatically fail the assignment and be subject to school and district penalties.

GRADING POLICY

Extra credit assignments may be available throughout the school year, but extra credit assignments will not be accepted **unless that student has turned in all of the class' required assignments**. Extra credit can account for no more than 2% of your overall grade.

Your grade will be weighted according to category and determined as follows:

There will be no rounding of grades (i.e. in order to earn an A-, a student needs to have a 90.0%).

**NOTE: Parents and Guardians— I regularly update grades on Q, and I require all students receive a parent signature and return a progress report during the 3rd week of each 6-week grading period. Any grade lower than a 70% is not considered passing; I will frequently phone home with information about Drama assignments if this percentage applies to your child. Please do not hesitate to contact me if you have concerns regarding your child's progress in my class.
